Susan Gesundheit “Elvis Tallis” Art Exhibit on Display at Council House Through December 21

NCJW/LA is now offering the community an opportunity to view a variety of art exhibits in our auditorium at Council House. The current exhibit, titled “Elvis Tallis,” showcases the work of Susan Gesundheit—paintings, prints, and collages that explore the surface of a two-dimensional graphic world with an extensive range of color and texture. Approximately 35 pieces, including monotypes, watercolors, and acrylics, are on exhibit. Gesundheit’s work displays a sense of interpretation and experimentation. As fall approaches, our thoughts at Women Helping Women (WHW) turn toward the myriad ways that we can give of ourselves in the New Year, in order to enrich our own lives and the lives of those in our community. This fall, our newly graduated Talkline counselors joined our seasoned volunteers in providing compassion and hope to callers from every walk of life. Our Court Watch volunteers renew their commitment to collecting data on domestic violence cases in family courts. Our Fundraising Committee works tirelessly to obtain gifts and personal items for the Holiday Gift bags for community members in need. And we all look forward to the upcoming fundraiser in January with Dr. Gary Smalls, where we will raise the money needed to provide these holiday gifts and other emergency services throughout the year.

WHW is pleased to announce that our Clothing Assistance Programs (CAPs) are giving to more people than ever. Our Annual Clothing Giveaway & Resource Fair in December, and our year-round Clothing Voucher Program, offering up to \$50 worth of Thrift store items, give more than clothing. They give a sense of dignity and self-worth to unemployed workers lacking

In addition, we gave more than 400 clothing vouchers for Council Thrift Shops as well as partnered with 11 social service agencies that distributed approximately 800 vouchers to their own clients in need of assistance.

appropriate attire for job interviews; children in need of new school clothes; homeless individuals who have little to call their own; families fleeing from violent homes who had to leave most of their belongings behind; or individuals who need help simply making ends meet.

Thanks to the generosity of our Scholarship Program donors, Women Helping Women awarded \$15,000 to 10 outstanding applicants in June.

The scholarship recipients included struggling single mothers, women leaving traumatic relationships, and nurses, teachers, and other professionals who share WHW's commitment to give back to our community. WHW hosted a Scholarship Program reception in October to honor and thank our Scholarship Program founders, current donors, and committee members for all they give to this vital program.

WHW is pleased to welcome our new Clinical Program Coordinator, **Judi Miller Levy**. Judi brings to our team tremendous expertise in working with children and families as well as specialized training in somatic experiencing. We are also pleased to welcome former WHW summer intern **Nikki Hemans** and Grant Coordinator, and former MSW intern **Jenny Blair** as our new Clinical Social Workers.

Our Women Helping Women social workers provide state-of-the-art clinical services to our therapy clients. This fall, we are offering **Women's Empowerment support groups** at Council House, at the Prototypes domestic violence shelter, and in Spanish at Home Safe. Along with our **Parent & Family Strengthening Workshop** at the Jewish Community Center, these vital programs give much more than a safe place for clients to explore their experiences, they give hope to women and families and empower them to heal from hardship and "bounce forward" in their lives.

Throughout the summer and early fall, NCJW/LA's Advocacy Committee continued its efforts to educate the public on how to stand up for social justice and take action.

An exciting workshop at Council House on July 25 titled "Your Voice: Learning to Lobby for Social Change" empowered students and professionals by equipping them with the tools to effectively influence public policy. A resounding success, the workshop garnered over 100 enthusiastic attendees from diverse backgrounds, including policy, law, social work, and public health. Attendees left Council House armed with action items on which to hone their newly acquired skills.

On August 22, a panel of experts on health care reform and the Affordable Care Act was moderated by **Michael Hiltzik**, author of *The New Deal: A Modern History* and business columnist for the *Los Angeles Times*. Speakers included **Paul Song, MD**, of Physicians for a National Health Program, California, **Susan Berke Fogel, JD**, director of reproductive health for National Health Law Program, **Jim Lott**, executive vice president of Hospital Association of Southern California, and **Mark Peterson**, professor of Public Policy, Political Science, and Law for the Department of Public Policy at UCLA.

We began the fall season of programs on September 12 with "Woman to Woman," a forum on

On September 24 and 25, we continued the voter-registration drive at Fairfax High School that was so successful in May. After the June primary election, several of the first-time voters contacted us to say thank you and let us know they felt so proud when they went into the voting booth. The number

of students we registered this year totaled 175. Thank you to the Advocacy volunteers who gave of their time to help make the voter drive a success.

This year we again partnered with the City of West Hollywood and Cedars-Sinai to host our Breast Cancer Awareness event. It was held at Council House on October 24.
