## Council Thrift Shops Celebrate their 90th Anniversary

Council Thrift Shops of the National Council of Jewish Women/Los Angeles is celebrating its 90th Anniversary of the first Thrift Shop that was opened in 1924 on East 7th Street in downtown Los Angeles. It was opened to respond to a need that was created by the waves of immigrants who had been displaced by World War I, many of whom settled in the LA area and were in desperate need of help. The Thrift Shop was originally stocked by member donations which were then distributed to the needy. Staffed only by volunteers, their first year brought in an amazing \$4,000!



Now in operation for 90 years, the mission is still the same: to provide clothing to those in need and support the programs and services through NCJW/LA's Women Helping Women Community Counseling and Support Services, and Women Helping Children Art and Literacy Programs for Youth, while working to better the lives of women, children and families in need throughout Los Angeles. With your continued support and donations to Council Thrift Shops, NCJW/LA is able to further its mission of improving the quality of life in our community.

## Message from the Executive Director



Whenever I speak to people about the National Council of Jewish Women/Los Angeles I always ask "How many of you donate to our Council Thrift Shops?" Usually a few hands go up around the room. I thank them for donating to our Shops but then go on to let them know that donating to Council Thrift helps NCJW/LA provide programs and services to over 15,000 individuals in-need and at-risk every year. I talk about Women Helping Women Community Counseling & Support Services and our Women Helping Children Art & Literacy Programs for Youth. The response I get as I describe our many programs is "I didn't know NCJW did all that." That response always troubles me as people make choices about where to donate based on their values, knowledge as well as convenience. We need to make sure people know where their money goes as it makes a difference to our donors.

This year Council Thrift is celebrating the 90<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the opening of its first shop. The program had been in existence for a few years before, but in 1924 NCJW/LA decided to open a Council Thrift Shop downtown. Having an actual store presence was not only a way to get needed clothes and furnishings to more individuals, but to let the Los Angeles community know that we were here to help. So as we celebrate, we cannot forget the importance our Council Thrift Shops make to our community.

Today we have eight locations in LA and the San Fernando Valley. Our Council Thrift Shops provide over 75% of the revenue to our NCJW/LA programs and services. Without your donations to our Council Thrift Shops, we would never be able to help so many women, children and families.

So we ask each of you to be our voice and let your friends, family and colleagues know about NCJW/LA Council Thrift Shops. We need you to help others. We need our community to make donations so we can continue to change lives.

# advocacy

As a 501c3 non-profit organization built on Advocacy, we are thankful and fortunate to be able to present incredible programs that have been made possible because of your donations to our respected and acclaimed Council Thrift Shops, which support our social justice work and help women, children and families in-need and at-risk.

We hope you will continue to donate and to encourage your family and friends to donate so we can continue to bring you the quality and timely Advocacy programs you look forward to.

In June we screened *Brave Miss World*. It is the true story of Miss Israel, a young woman who was the victim of a serial sexual predator in Italy, just before she won the Miss World crown. It recounted her successful campaign to break the silence, identify previous victims and to finally see that justice was done.

In July, we presented a panel of activists who have been fighting to stem the problem of Domestic Child Trafficking (a national priority), and to rescue the child victims. The program was moderated by Sandy Banks, the Los Angeles Times award-winning journalist.

On September 17, with the League of Women Voters, we will present an informative discussion and analysis of all of the ballot measures that will appear on the November, 2014 ballot.

We are excited that on October 8 we will present a panel of three outstanding constitutional experts who will analyze the significant impact of the 2013–2014 U.S. Supreme Court Decisions. This program will be moderated by Political Journalist for KCBS/KCAL, Dave Bryan.

In November, we are presenting a program on Elder Abuse and Senior Scams. There will be a 45-minute long presentation of serious but entertaining skits performed by a group of retired actors. Following will be a Q & A with a member of the District Attorney's office and the Department of Consumer Affairs.

Community Counseling and Support Services

## Women Helping Women congratulates Council Thrift on 90 years of service in our community!

Council Thrift is truly the "single candle" that lights a thousand more at NCJW/LA. From this one precious resource, Women Helping Women is able to offer free, state-of-the-art, long-term psychotherapy to approximately 175 individuals each year, and serve another 1,154 through our Counseling Talkline, and 2,312 through our supportive services programs.

It is also thanks to Council Thrift that Women Helping Women's therapy services have neither time limits, nor mandatory fees. And this precious resource frees us to continually assess and respond to the unique needs of our clients and our community, without the constraints or limitations often imposed by external funding sources. No other therapy program in Los Angeles has this degree of flexibility, and we are eternally grateful to our Council Thrift staff, and to all the families throughout the greater Los Angeles area who make this possible by donating their gently used clothing, books and furniture.

Women Helping Women (WHW) also helps to spread the "light" of Council Thrift throughout the year through our Clothing Assistance Programs (CAPs). Through CAPs, WHW therapists and Talkline counselors offer 452 clothing vouchers a year to clients and callers, enabling them to shop for free at our Council Thrift Shops. In addition, WHW partners with 16 agencies throughout Los Angeles, who together offer 2,130 clothing vouchers annually to their clients. Individuals served through CAPs include people who

At the Annual Clothing Giveaway on December 7, our volunteers and staff will work tirelessly to sort clothing, stuffed animals and books, set up our parking lot, and give away items to as many as 3,000 individuals. WHW will also host a resource fair in conjunction with the Giveaway, inviting partner agencies to share resources with our community.

are homeless, women and children escaping domestic abuse, children whose families cannot afford back-to-school clothing, and individuals in need of business clothing for job interviews.

In order to support Council Thrift, Women Helping Women launched a "Clothes for Healing" donation drive that we will conduct each spring in conjunction with our annual Clothesline Reception. At this event, members of our community come together with survivors of abuse and trauma to witness survivors' artwork, and create artwork together.

To all these programs, Women Helping Women is proud to spread the light of hope and compassion that is represented by each item generously donated to our Council Thrift Shops. On Thrift's 90th anniversary, we extend our gratitude to the NCJW/LA members, staff, volunteers and donors who make our work possible every day. Together, we are spreading hope and happiness throughout our community.

Ten students received scholarships in the spring cycle. Another ten students will receive scholarships this December. WHW scholarship recipients are single mothers, teachers, nurses, and other community members who often have difficulty financing their education due to their income level and the lack of scholarship opportunities that recognize their particular obstacles and needs. They are passionate about their chosen professions and eager to create paths for themselves that will improve their families and communities. Over the summer, WHW increased its outreach for the Scholarship Program to raise awareness about this unique opportunity for students in the Los Angeles area.

# Empower Yourself All Year Long

## LEGISLATIVE ACTION

This summer, we celebrated the 90th anniversary of NCJW/LA's Council Thrift Shops. With this momentous occasion, the Legislative and Community Engagement department thought a lot about the ways in which Council Thrift has supported social justice in Los Angeles through being our biggest donor! We thank Council Thrift's staff and volunteers for their hard work and passion for making Los Angeles a better place and for supporting social justice advocacy and women's empowerment through NCJW/LA.

This July, NCJW/LA launched six new working groups to create and implement campaigns focused on legislative change. The six working groups cover the important social justice issues of human trafficking, domestic violence, gun violence prevention, reproductive justice, health care, and children's rights. We welcome you to join the working groups and work on writing petitions, lobbying elected officials, testifying at hearings, and organizing the community around these issues.

Beyond the six working groups, we have another new and exciting group that formed this summer: Teen Advocacy Working Group. A group of four high school students joined together to volunteer intern at NCJW/LA and create our first ever Teen Advocacy Working Group. They reach out to teens in Los Angeles and educate and empower them to get involved in social justice advocacy. All high school aged teens are welcome to join the working group!

Every year, NCJW/LA advocates for bills that safeguard the rights and freedoms of women and children in California. This year, we worked hard on passing a bill that would require ammunition purchasers and sellers to be background checked in order to both buy and sell ammunition. In support of this bill's passage, we created a petition to Governor Brown for which we garnered over 160 signatures.

Our Human Trafficking Outreach Project continues to make waves in raising awareness about human trafficking and providing pertinent hotline information to witnesses and victims of human trafficking throughout LA County. We conducted trainings for new volunteers in Monterey Park and Sherman Oaks this summer and would love to train you as well.

Our final Advocacy Training Project sessions took place this summer. Four participants received a certificate of completion from The City of West Hollywood's City Council for participating in all six sessions and becoming effective advocates for their cause. We look forward to restarting the program next year and we thank all of our facilitators and the program chair Sandra Fluke for giving their time and expertise to this program.

We are grateful to our summer interns, Hannah Seligman and Trevor Yee, for their hard work and dedication to NCJW/LA this summer. We wish them the best in their educational pursuits over the coming year.


## Art & Literacy Programs for Youth

As the start of the 2014–15 school year is upon us, Women Helping Children Arts and Literacy Programs for Youth are celebrating our successes of the past year and looking forward to continuing to grow our programs and services in the academic year ahead.

Light Up a Library and After-School Homework Club brought volunteers to work with over 1,600 students at five different elementary schools. We had a great year with our After-School Homework Club programs at Laurel Span School and Rosewood Elementary School. We worked with students grades 1–8 to help them with homework completion and comprehension. Volunteers at both locations helped the students grow academically over the course of the year and students, parents

and teachers alike were grateful for the progress made by the students involved.

After a devastating fire tore through their facility in early May, the San Fernando Valley Rescue Mission reached out to their community partners for help with the beginning of their rebuilding process. Along with the support of WHC Committee Members and all of our Women Making a Difference groups, we were able to donate two car loads of supplies to shelter families. We will continue to work with shelter staff to provide them with additional support and volunteers as they work towards their re-opening in the Fall.



Donating books to NCJW/LA through our eight Thrift locations is a wonderful way to sponsor our programming. Thanks to our wonderful Thrift donation program, we are able to sponsor book giveaways throughout the year to local libraries, hospitals and clinics. We are also able to giveaway 1,000 books every December at our Annual Clothing Giveaway thanks to the generosity of Council Thrift and its donors. We are truly grateful for this support in promoting literacy for children in Los Angeles.

Our students and volunteers at McAlister San Fernando went on a day trip to the Getty Museum in late May to culminate their semester of art learning and education. Students went on a docent-led tour of the museum's galleries and discussed art technique and inspiration.

**VOLUNTEER** We are actively recruiting volunteers for our art education programs (Art Pals and Art Bridges Culture), After-School Homework Club, Light Up a Library, tutoring and mentorship at McAlister Regional High School for pregnant and parenting teens and shelter-based tutoring and enrichment programs. We have programs running throughout each day and throughout the week in the valley and the city so we can work with you to find a program that fits your needs and schedule.
