An Update from the Executive Director

For those of you who know me you know I believe that the basic principle in life is that one should not make decisions because they are easy; or because they are popular; one should make them because they are right!" No matter what the odds or what the popular feelings are we do what is right.

This is the core of how and why NCJW was started and who we are today. It is one of the reasons I came to NCJW. "Doing Right" has meant and means a place that touches and changes lives. We, at NCJW/LA, stand tall

and proud of what we have accomplished over the past 100 years and the thousands upon thousands of lives we have touched.

Many of you know the work we do or at least know about some of our programs. But do you really know the impact we have made and continue to make in the lives of women, children and families in Los Angeles...

- A child who has no one to help them with their homework looks to our volunteers in our After School Homework Clubs to work with them and help them make sure their homework is done.
- A mother struggling with her teen daughter not knowing who to turn to ... gets connected to one of our therapists at her daughter's high school and both the mother and daughter begin counseling at Council House.
- A father participates in family counseling to help his family thrive and grow.
- There was a survivor of human trafficking speaking on our panel at our Advocacy event who now works for us educating and promoting awareness of human trafficking and helping Spanish speaking callers on our Counseling Talkline
- A volunteer tutoring teen mothers to help them graduate high school and deciding they need help knowing about child care options and works to get the information to them... helping them cope not just with school but with life.
- Or the young women receiving financial aid through our Scholarship Program to go back to school and learn skills that will help her get a job.
- And the young couple with a small child who does not have much and come to our Council Thrift Shops to find clothes and furniture they can afford.

The stories we can tell and the people's lives we have been able to touch and help change go on and on

Whether it was low income at-risk girls coming to our El Nido program in the early and mid 1900's ...or women learning to be leaders of our community in the 1970's and 80's or the counseling and literacy programs we provide today ... touching and helping change the lives of others has always been our mission.

Our community has grown and changed but no matter what the prevailing winds have been... NCJW/LA has been there and will continue to be there for those in-need and at-risk in our community, always doing things because they are “right”.

The tenacity of those women that began NCJW and bred the women's movement ...along with creating the beginnings of women in leadership roles in government and within our community ... stand with us today. Our lives are bound to what we do each day to help another. *If we are only for ourselves who are we...* At NCJW/LA we know that we are not here just for ourselves but we are here for others.

At Women Helping Women, we know that it takes more than money to enrich a community, and more than housing to make a home. People in our community need scholarships and clothing and shelter, but they also need safety and encouragement and human kindness. Our staff, interns and volunteers respond to those needs every day, and in giving of ourselves, we too are enriched.

At a time when money is tight, resources are scarce, and anxiety is high, we are giving rental assistance, holiday gifts, scholarships and free clothing... But we also give so much more: we give our time and our hearts, we create safety and community, and we offer encouragement and hope.

• This fall, WHW established a new Rental Assistance Program as part of our Emergency Survival Fund. Thanks to a generous grant from the City of West Hollywood, we were able to help seven families avoid eviction and homelessness, and to connect them with resources and support.



Thanks to our volunteers & donors we provided \$10,000 worth of holiday gift certificates to help families exchange gifts and share a holiday meal with their loved ones.

• We received 78 scholarship applications for our winter cycle, and thanks to the generosity of our wonderful Scholarship Committee, we awarded over \$15,000 in scholarships this December!

• Once again, Thrift, WHC and WHW collaborated to host our Annual Free Clothing

Giveaway on December 6, bringing much-needed clothing, community resources and hope to 3,000 men, women, and children in Los Angeles.

• Through a new partnership with Prototypes domestic violence shelter, our social work staff and interns are now offering our Women's Empowerment/ WE Share support groups for trauma survivors at the Prototypes drop-in center in Hollywood.

NEWS FROM WOMEN HELPING CHILDREN

NCJW/LA Women Helping Children Volunteers have really stepped up to the plate this school year to meet the unmet needs of LAUSD students. We have expanded our Tutoring and Enrichment program at Gramercy Place to two nights a week since the young residents are in need of additional support. In addition, Women Helping Children has collaborated with parents at Rosewood Elementary school to expand the After School Homework Club. The program will meet multiple times a week in an effort to provide additional academic support.

WHC VOLUNTEERS CONNECT WITH TEEN MOMS

In addition to providing academic assistance, WHC Volunteers at McAlister High School have identified additional ways to support the girls in the program. McAlister Volunteers have been working with the Teen Moms as their service learning project to create lists of child care resources. The School's Administration is grateful for the support the girls receive from WHC Volunteers. The Teen Moms are also excited to visit a local museum this Spring since most of them have never been to a museum!

ART PALS HEADS TO UCLA THIS SPRING

Third Graders enrolled in WHC's Art Pals program will experience **Nick Cave: Meet Me at the Center of the Earth**, the largest presentation of work by Chicago-based artist Nick Cave, featuring thirty-five of his Soundsuits—multi-layered, mixed-media sculptures named for the sounds made when the "suits" are worn. Mad, humorous, visionary, glamorous and unexpected, the Soundsuits are created from scavenged ordinary materials that Cave re-contextualizes into extraordinary works of art. The Fowler is the first LA-area museum to feature Cave's work and the only Southern California venue for this traveling exhibition.

In addition, Art Pals will tour UCLA's Sculpture garden and enjoy lunch on campus.

BEN'S BOOKS RINGS IN THE NEW YEAR

Early this year, the Ben's Books Committee delivered sets of Ben's

Books to various schools and medical facilities such as the LA County/ USC hospital, Conejo Valley Free Clinic, LA Family Housing facilities, Valley Child Guidance Clinic, Shriner's Hospital for Children, Clinica Romero, Mission City Community Network, South Central Family Health Center, as well as Canoga Park, Reseda, and Shenandoah Elementary Schools. NCJW/LA Advocacy presented several dynamic programs with large, diverse community attendance and media attention.

In August we presented SHADOW WORLD-HATE CRIMES. Our esteemed moderator was Dave Bryan CBS Political Reporter and the panel included FBI Special Agent Peter Kaupp; Stephen Rohde ESQ., ACLU; Ariella Lowenstein, Associate Director ADL; and Dr. Edward Dunbar, UCLA Professor and profiler of hate crime perpetrators for law enforcement.



Mavis Leno joined us in September for a program focused on the WOMEN OF AFGHANISTAN and the Taliban.

NCJW President Nancy Ratzan provided us with a very informative insight into her vision and plans for NCJW in October at an informal brunch at Le Parc. We were joined by some of our local Sections and had the opportunity for a meet and greet and discussion of Section activities.

Our November program on GUNS, GANGS and GRAFFITI was a tremendous success, bringing together law enforcement, social service providers and former gang members. Our dynamic panel was moderated by David Ono, ABC7 Eyewitness News and consisted of Father Greg

Boyle, Executive Director and Founder of Home Boy Industries; Dawn Brown, Executive Director of Girls & Gangs; Guillermo Cespedes,

Director of Gang Reduction and Youth Development for the City of Los Angeles; Sergeant Curtis Woodle, LAPD Gang Intervention Coordinator; and also representing Home Boys were two former gang members who gave us a very honest insight into why youth turns to gangs.

On December 9, 2009, Advocacy presented an evening program on 'SICK FOR PROFIT' with Award Winning Producer, Director and Founder of Brave New Films, Robert Greenwald and Executive Director of Brave New Films, Jim Miller.

Our annual ROE V.WADE CELEBRATION will be held on January 21, 2010 and cosponsored with the City of West Hollywood.

Some very exciting programs are being planned for 2010 which will include revisiting WOMEN IN PRISON; focusing on TEENAGE TRAFFICKING and the SEPARATION OF CHURCH AND STATE.
